About this edition of the Geneva Trialogue

The first Geneva Trialogue on Knowledge and the SDGs aims at encouraging interactions and fostering partnerships between the academic world, the IGOs, NGOs and the industry around SDGs. This event is hosted by University of Geneva and is part of a recent partnership with China's Tsinghua University that aims to trigger an effort at different levels – local, regional and international – to develop practical solutions for the Sustainable Development Goals set by the United Nations.

This Sino-Swiss partnership between the best Chinese technological university and one of the best European research universities provides a unique opportunity to develop practical solutions to achieve the SDGs. This collaboration brings together the global governance skills and experience gathered in Geneva, and Tsinghua University's unique innovation center in Shenzhen, where the jump from scientific conception to technological production will be feasible in record time.

Beyond the Geneva Trialogue, the partnership includes various programs, notably an innovative Master that will train future generations on SDG implementation as of September 2017, but also Summer schools, and an accelerator for the outcoming projects. An executive education program will also be set up to provide all the tools necessary for the implementation of sustainable development policies in a city, a region, a company or an organization.
